

HOUSE OF THE SIXTEENTH CENTURY

This house is a fine example of a Gothic house, built in limestone and yellow sandstone, with two floors plus attic. The angle chains are made of dressed stone and to the street side, the half-hipped roof is pitched. We can see some fine Renaissance mullioned windows, with dressed stone frames and scrolled jambs. The front door with a lintel dated back to 1592 is a remarkable wear on the wall. The jambs of the door frame are dressed with rolling acanthus leaves.



In 1823, it was owned by Thiébaud Reymann, to remain in his family until the end of the 1930s. It then went to the Schaub/Meyer family, and it was one of the last farms of the village. The house was refitted in apartments at the end of the 1990s, by Mrs Masson born Meyer, after the transfer of the farm near the shooting range, on the "rue Basse" (Low Street). This change of affectation enables the saving of this building which otherwise would have been destroyed.
